President's Message

By the time that you receive this newsletter our summer will be drawing to a close. I do hope that everyone took advantage of the weather to enjoy all that our province has to offer. Soon your board along with other volunteers will begin finalizing arrangements for the many activities and events planned for our members. A list of these, are found later in this newsletter.

Because of the changes to our by-laws and regulations necessitated by the National Not for Profit Act it became necessary for the Administrative Guidelines for Branches to be updated. These Guidelines are developed to assist with branch operations. As a branch president I was asked to participate in reviewing the work done to date. Much work has been done already but a draft of the Guidelines is still to be shared with all the branch presidents and Branch Services Coordinators BSCs (formally known as Regional Services Officers - RSO's) for their comments before it can be finalized.

As a member of the national Risk Management Committee I provided input to the Enterprise Risk Management Plan that was submitted and approved by the National Board of Directors.

Highlights from the Annual Meeting of Members (AMM)

On June 28th your board of directors got together to be debriefed by those members who attended the AMM.

Elections were held at the AMM to fill vacancies on the national board of directors. Jean-Guy Souliere was elected as our National President and Roy Goodall was elected as National Vice President. As you may recall, Roy was one of our Prairie District Directors and he had not completed his full term which means that position must now be filled. According to our national by-laws the Board may, within 90 days following the position becoming vacant, fill the vacancy by appointment from the list of nominees provided or by appointing a nominee of their choosing. A call for nominations was sent out with a deadline of August 8th for submissions. It has been confirmed that Anne Ashcroft, former branch president of the Saskatoon branch will be our second Prairie District Director. I have known Anne for a few years and am confident that her experience at the branch level will serve us well.

Issues Raised at the Presidents' Forum

At the AMM time is set aside for the presidents to get together to identify key issues, recommend a process with a goal of developing solutions. Some issues that came out of the discussions included the uneven level of engagement of presidents across the country. In many instances

where input is requested less than 10% of presidents respond. I find this most troubling as I view this as a significant responsibility of presidents.

Another issue of concern expressed by the presidents was the level of engagement of members which included attendance at meetings. As a result of a member survey, our branch has been able to offer a variety of activities that have been well attended. In addition, we have been able to secure speakers whose subjects are topics that our members have requested.

Many branches are struggling, particularly in recruiting board members and to this end some branches are having to seek dissolution. I am most pleased that our branch has a full slate of board members. We do recognize however, the need to be on the alert to identify and encourage members with the knowledge and expertise that will enable our branch to continue to be relevant.

Strategic Plan

The national strategic plan was approved. Now the work begins to put the plan in motion. Your board will ensure that our efforts will go towards supporting the national goals wherever possible.

Below is a call for volunteers to fill very important positions to the branch and to the region. Please note the contacts for finding out further information. Also, if you know of someone who would be an excellent candidate, let us know and we will follow up.

Finally, I wish to acknowledge the contributions made on your behalf by your board of directors. Without their commitment to serve you we would not be able to achieve as much as we have.

Call for Volunteers

Health Benefits Officer (HBO): As mentioned in earlier communications with members Barb Smith-Molloy is seeking a mentee for the position of (HBO). Barb's term expires in April 2017 and she would like to leave the position in good hands. The main role of the HBO is to provide information and respond to members regarding aspects of the Public Service Health Care Plan (PSHCP) and the Pensioners Dental Service Plan (PDSP) including eligibility, coverage and how to submit their claim or appeal. This can include the following responsibilities:

- periodically reviews plan documents and reviews information with national office staff to ensure accurate information is provided to members
- may make presentations about the PSHCP and/or PDSP at branch general meetings and/or writes a related article for the branch newsletter
- informs national office of problems or issues that their regional members experience with the PSHCP and the PDSP
- participates in HBO teleconferences, webinars, etc.
- keeps current by consulting the HBO intranet site on a regular basis

As a board member will attend board and general meetings (total maximum 7/year), support special events, may lead a committee, and participates in decision making at the board level. Branch Services Coordinator (BSC) formally Regional Services Officer

An opening for this position has come about as a result of the retirement of Stan Hrabarchuk. Stan has been a member of our Branch for several years and has held many positions both locally and nationally. When we found ourselves without an RSO two years ago Stan volunteered once again to support the Association and our region. It is time for him to enjoy his retirement and to pass the torch.

The following describes the position that now needs to be filled:

Each geographical region has a BSC. This region has five (5) branches located as follows: Winnipeg, Portage la Prairie, Pinawa, Brandon and Thunder Bay. The focus of the role is to provide administrative, operational support and training to the branches. To do this, the BSC will work with national staff as a key team member. The assistance includes, but is not limited to: orientation of new board members, member recruitment and retention, membership database, finance and accounting, communications, marketing; convenes annual regional meetings of branches to discuss administrative issues, exchange information and for training of branch volunteers; annually meets with each branch in the region; attends AMM as an observer; maintains liaison with the District Director; and proposes an annual budget for the BSC in consultation with the branches.

The support required by each branch will depend on their particular level of expertise. Some branches may require little support while others, particularly the smaller branches may need more.

Presidents within each region submit names of potential candidates to their District Director who will finalize the selection. Candidates should be committed to the goals of the Association, a dedicated team player, have excellent communication skills, high comfort level with technology. The duties of this position at first glance may seem somewhat onerous but there is a lot of support for this position both from the national level as well as locally. The term is for a period of three years. This position is viewed as critical to the ongoing success of our Association. Be assured that all measure of assistance will be given to the BSC to ensure their comfort with the duties.

Following our Annual General Meeting in April, we have initiated the transition from our own FSNA website to the new branch website. We will slowly populate the various navigation menus with existing and new informative documentation. Membership Report - Dorothy Watermulder

As at August 8, 2016 we have a total of 6097 active memberships which includes 47 new memberships in our Branch. The drop of 227 memberships from last report is due to a large number of members who have not paid their fees and became inactive. 

Health Benefits Officer report -Barb Smith-Molloy

I have received several inquiries over the past few months and I would encourage you to contact me if you have any questions regarding your health benefits. I. EMERGENCY TRAVEL ASSISTANCE BENEFIT

Federal retires with supplementary coverage with Sun Life have a Travel benefit of \$500,000 while traveling outside of your province.

If it is medically necessary to use an ambulance, either in Manitoba or elsewhere in Canada and the United States, Sun Life will pay 80% of the cost.

If, based on medical need, you need to be transported by air, Sun Life will pay 100% of the cost, up to the \$500,000 limit. "Medical need" is determined by Alliance Global Assistance 1-800-667-2883 in Canada and the United States. From all other countries call collect 519-742-1342.

Alliance Global Assistance's 24-hour help line can be called any time emergency help is needed while traveling.

II. WE'RE LUCKY IF WE GET TO BE OLD, PHYSICIAN AND PROFESSOR BELIEVES.

"I have a confession to make," Bill Thomas announced several months ago at a conference on aging in Oregon. "I am an old man." "No, you're not!" an audience member called out. It was meant, no doubt, as a compliment: Despite his gray-streaked beard and crow's feet, the 56-year-old geriatrician-cum-thespian crackles with high-octane energy. And isn't that what we all want to hear as we age? That we don't look old? That we seem younger than we are? It's not what Thomas wants to hear. After more than 20 years of trying to make life better for old people, he believes the correct message is the opposite: That we are lucky if we get to grow old. That there is a "third" phase of life beyond adulthood that can be as rich as either of the phases that came before.

"Man, I've got a lot of work to do," he said to himself that day in Oregon.

In the land of Botox and celebrity teenagers and the 18-to-34-year-old target consumer, the idea that old age can be as rewarding as youth is not an easy sell. In fact, Thomas believes that Americans have bought so willingly into the idea of aging as something to be feared that it has become a self-fulfilling prophecy leading to isolation, loneliness and lack of autonomy. He wants to change that, and he is well qualified for the job.

The Harvard Medical School-trained physician and professor at the University of Maryland Baltimore County's Erickson School of Aging is known for sparking explosive new ideas in elder care. He is particularly well-known for pioneering "The Eden Alternative" — a radical system of humanizing nursing homes by introducing a radical system of humanizing nursing homes by introducing live animals and plants.
